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Combating Trafficking in Persons Training on JKO

JKO values our long-standing relationship with the Department of Defense (DOD) Combating Trafficking in Persons Program Management Office (CTIP PMO) in assisting them in the development of mission-critical, creative and engaging training courses and resources. The CTIP PMO is the lead office responsible for coordinating DOD efforts to prevent human trafficking, prosecute traffickers and assist in the protection of victims. The DOD CTIP PMO falls within the purview of the [Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness \(USD \(P&R\)\)](#) in the [Defense Human Resources Activity \(DHRA\)](#). DHRA is responsible for CTIP policy development, planning, resource management and program evaluation for all of DOD. CTIP PMO is responsible for overseeing, developing and providing the tools necessary for implementing the [National Security Presidential Directive \(NSPD\) 22](#) within DOD. The NSPD 22 declares the United States government’s “zero tolerance” policy for trafficking in persons (TIP).

“Departments and agencies shall ensure that all of the appropriate offices within their jurisdiction are fully trained to carry out their responsibilities to combat trafficking.”

In working with the CTIP PMO in developing training courses, JKO has introduced some of its most innovative product development and training techniques. We greatly admire the CTIP PMO dedication to the mission and their determination to produce impactful training and awareness resources. These include the training courses in general, but more so, the creation of survivor videos, the development of curriculum toolkits, infographics and posters in multiple languages. The training resources are hosted on JKO as well as other learning management systems and are created to address specific audiences and training objectives including General Awareness, Investigative Professionals (law enforcement, criminal and DOD Office of Inspector General), Acquisition Personnel, DOD Education Activity school personnel, and supplemental training for Legal Counsel. [CTIP trainings](#) provide an overview of trafficking including signs of trafficking, key policies and procedures, and reporting. Most recently, JKO worked with CTIP to create specialized training for chaplains. Chaplains are often a first point of contact for victims and survivors of human trafficking. We also created a Chaplains Toolkit on Trafficking. The toolkit is a “grab and go” set of action cards that include survivor stories, videos, one-pagers, infographics, case studies, pocket cards, desk guides and other resources. The Healthcare and Human Trafficking Training and Toolkit were created for healthcare providers because they also are often the first point of contact for victims. They must be able to identify the signs and indicators of human trafficking in a DOD hospital or healthcare setting and respond effectively. Our current distinguished alumni, **Chief Master Sergeant Anthony D. Sims, command senior enlisted leader (CSEL), Maryland National Guard** provides insights about the impact of EJPME on his career path.

What is your current role? As CSEL for the Maryland National Guard, I serve as the primary advisor to the Adjutant General on all enlisted matters affecting more than 5,000 Soldiers and Airmen who serve their state and nation. I could not be prouder of the work they do to support local communities here at home when disaster strikes or when they're called upon to protect our freedom around the world.

How has EJPME impacted your experiences in a joint environment?

EJPME is a must to advance your professional development within the National Guard. It fosters the understanding of our other services' culture, provides insight into the operational aspects of teams and how they perform their missions, and provides the groundwork for communication, through common terminology. Overall, it's the foundation to start building your joint professional military experience.

Tell us about an experience you've had where your EJPME knowledge came into play.

I recently attended the Keystone course at the National Defense University and found myself falling back on the topics presented in the EJPME courses. I often find myself reflecting on various portions of EJPME when communicating and various encounters with my Army National Guard brothers and sisters.

What is the most important thing you've learned about joint operations?

We now operate in a joint environment more than ever before, and you'll need to arm yourself with knowledge to keep the competitive edge against our nation's adversaries. It becomes most relevant when operating in organizations like the 169th Cyber Protection Team, the 175th Cyber Operations Group, the A-10 Operations Group, and during engagements with our partner nations Estonia and Bosnia and Herzegovina in the State Partnership Program. Another example is our recent COVID-19 Operations.

"EJPME isn't the end of your joint environment journey, it's the beginning. EJPME courses are foundational. These courses armed me with the basic knowledge to function in the joint operations environment."

What do you think is the most important thing you've learned about joint operations?

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What advice do you have for current students?

Do it! As a member of the profession of arms, we're required to professionally develop ourselves and be prepared to function in diverse environments. One of those environments will be joint. Complete the courses and establish that foundational knowledge to continue and propel your career.

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As the CSEL for the Maryland National Guard the morale, training, and discipline of our members is one of my highest priorities.

Latest Zero Trust Training on JKO



Zero Trust Architecture, introduced as a federal government requirement by May 2021 Executive Order 14028 *Improving the Nation's Cybersecurity*, is necessary to bolster national cybersecurity. The DOD Zero Trust Strategy and Roadmap, released in November 2022 now calls for implementation of Zero Trust along with the considerable cultural change. The strategy outlines integrated, strategic goals that define what the DOD will do to achieve and execute Zero Trust Architecture principles.

“Defending DOD networks with high-powered and ever-more sophisticated perimeter defenses is no longer sufficient for achieving cyber resiliency and securing our information enterprise that spans geographic borders, interfaces with external partners, and support to millions of authorized users, many of which now require access to DOD networks outside traditional boundaries, such as work from home. To meet these challenges, the DOD requires an enhanced cybersecurity framework built upon Zero Trust principles that must be adopted across the Department, enterprise-wide, as quickly as possible as described within this document.” (DOD Zero Trust Strategy, 07 Nov 2022)

Zero Trust Strategy training courses are designed to facilitate implementation of this requirement. The first course begins with general awareness of Zero Trust for all audiences across the DOD enterprise. Additional one-hour courses are tailored for specific audiences, including executives and information technology professionals.

These courses are provided by the Chief Information Officer's Zero Trust Portfolio Management Office (ZT PfMO) in collaboration with Defense Acquisition University (DAU) and are hosted on JKO:

DOD -US003- DoD Zero Trust Awareness Course (1hr)- The goal of this course is to explain why Zero Trust is a critical concept that should become a major focus for cybersecurity across the DOD. It provides an awareness of the implications of implementing Zero Trust and explains why it is a critical concept that should become a major focus for cybersecurity across the DOD.

DOD -US005 Zero Trust for DoD Executives Course (1hr)- For the DOD executive, the implementation of Zero Trust principles is crucial to enhance the cybersecurity posture (at an organizational, service, and DOD enterprise level) and protect sensitive information. The overarching goal of this course is to help the DOD executive learn to recognize critical Zero Trust (ZT) principles as they embark on the ZT journey.

DOD -US006 Zero Trust Strategy and Guidance (1hr)- This course presents underlying strategic guidance and policy for implementing Zero Trust across DOD organizations.

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Tips for the Training Coordinator

JKO LMS Version 11 released in October. Here's a summary of the enhancements:

- Privileged users can now **customize LMS automated email subject lines**.
- Tech. admins can **add enterprise-wide login page text**.
- **Alternate email address field added** to the JKO profile so that users have an additional option to receive password, user name, and account reactivation instructions if they don't have access to their business email address.
- The LMS now offers an **automated account reactivation** function on the login page, negating the requirement to contact the Help Desk.
- All organization search windows can now **search by organization code as well as organization name**.
- JKO can now **track and report course/curriculum enrollments from the Joint Exercise Training Support (JETS)** links in the Exercises Tab.
- **Direct link from a JKO community or course directly to a VCLASS site** without the need to manually add/enroll the user to that VCLASS site.

And summary of the fixes:

- Enrollment expiry date now updates correctly when a user is moved from one section to another.
- A 'manager approval' course must now have at least one course manager or section instructor selected for the course to display in the course catalog.
- Removed a duplicate 'set test status' field from the update multiple test status function in manage gradebook.
- Number of courses to be associated to an organization or audience assignment no longer limited to eight.
- Training coordinators and managers can no longer be removed from their organization and retain their privileged user rights from the organization maintenance gadget.

NOTE: Users can now reactivate their own accounts without having to contact the JKO Help Desk. Using the 'reactivate account' link on the login page, users will receive instructions to reactivate their account if username and email address information match their JKO profile.

Users must then create a new password to reactivate their account. The most common reason for deactivated accounts is three incorrect username/password login attempts.

Some accounts are not eligible for reactivation using this link. Accounts not eligible to be reactivated using this link:

- account cancelled by admin
- merged Accounts
